"I always wanted to be a firefighter and figured the National Guard was the best way to get a leg up on the competition," Shields explained, highlighting the advantages of Guard service, combining his military background and medic training in both worlds.

His military skills have proven valuable in his civilian career, where Shields has received two lifesaving awards.

Waukee Fire Department Lieutenant Josh Hutton notes, "Firefighter Shields continues to be very dependable. He [assists] the crew with everything that is asked of him with very minimal direction needed. He has continued to carry on this trait and is someone you can count on and trust on medical calls.

Having received advanced first-responder medical training during his 2.5 years as a Guard member, Shields effectively employs his skills to benefit the Waukee community. The Army combat medic's training exposed him to advanced medical practices, making him a multi-capable care provider.

"We get our EMT [emergency medical technician] training through the Army," Shields added. "We get a little more in-depth for specifically trauma care and tactical field carry, then we can focus on more different illnesses you may see.

Shields' dedication to service extends beyond firefighting, as he instructs and develops combat medics at the Medical Simulations Training Center at Camp Dodge, Iowa. Command Sgt. Maj. Matthew T. Strasser, Iowa National Guard senior enlisted leader, praised him for being an incredible instructor and leader for the State of Iowa and the Army

"Spc. Shields' assists in the development and instruction. of all 68W [Combat] Medics that rotate through ... his demeanor, expertise and general knowledge of the military from participating in the competitions make him an incredible instructor and leader within the MSTC and beyond."

Shields recently made history by competing at the National level in the Army National

Guard National Best Warrior Competition. He reflected on the accomplishment, "I'm actually our [unit's] first Soldier to compete at the National level. It's a big deal and groundbreaking for us ... a very high honor."

Strasser highlights the motivational impact of Shields' achievements, inspiring others to strive for excellence in competition.

"Spc. Shields ... has impacted motivation and raised awareness of opportunities for our Soldiers and will continue to be our mouthpiece for what this has done for him personally from a readiness and development standpoint."

Determined to advance his medical background, Shields plans to start paramedic school and pursue a bachelor's degree in Firefighter Science Administration to become a fire officer while continuing his career as a member of the Iowa National Guard, crediting the opportunities as Citizen-Soldier as key to making a difference to saving lives in and out of uniform.













#### HELICOPTER RESCUE TRAINING

While military pilots are regularly schooled in survival, they don't often have the opportunity to practice the intricacies of being hoisted into a helicopter.

Iowa National Guard Airmen and Soldiers were practicing helicopter extractions of a downed pilot near Homer, Nebraska. this week.

Exercise orchestrator and Iowa Air National Guard Survival Specialist, Master Sgt. Jeff Campbell said water survival is a regular training requirement. Campbell said experiencing things like the wind, noise and height of hoist training is a crucial part of surviving.

"There is a lot of chaos and a lot of stuff going on, the more we can get our aircrew trained the better it will be for everyone involved," Campbell said. The exercise in Homer had Iowa National Guard Airmen catching a lift from their Iowa Army Guard counterparts using a UH-60 Black Hawk helicopter.

The downed pilots in the training exercise are from Iowa's 185th Air Refueling Wing in Sioux City. The pilot's rescuers are from the Iowa Army National Guard's Detachment 1, Company C, 2/211<sup>th</sup> General Aviation Support Battalion based in Davenport.

After making the trip from the opposite side of the Hawkeye State to the Northeast Nebraska hamlet near Sioux City, the Black Hawk aircrew landed in a freshly cut hay field. The open space next to a large pond doubled as a handy training area for the day where the trainees first received a safety briefing.

There was a tinge of nervousness at first as KC-135 pilots are not accustomed to handing control of their takeoff and landing to someone else. One by one however, each member of the group was harnessed into a rescue strop or harness and hoisted to the helicopter.

As temperatures climbed into the mid-80s the group of around a dozen pilots jumped into the nearby water. One by one they waited to be extracted from the water as they were sprayed with a shower of rotor wash.

The bottom line, according to Campbell, is sewing in muscle memory so each pilot knows what to do during a rescue situation.

"If something does happen and they find themselves alone in the water they will have the tools and the knowledge to get through it," said Campbell.

During the training, each Airmen experienced helplessness and trust of relying on their rescuer to bring them to safety. Iowa Soldiers got to utilize their rescue equipment and were able to complete some of their own training requirements.

Pilots never relish the idea of being in a situation where they need to be rescued. By punctuating their training with practical experience, the goal of the training is to provide the tools and assurance for surviving a worst-case scenario.

#### A VEHICLE OF THE FUTURE

IOWA TRAINING CENTER RECEIVES NEW TACTICAL VEHICLES | BY SGT. 1ST CLASS TAWNY KRUSE

JOHNSTON, Iowa – The Iowa Ordnance Training Center at Camp Dodge has received three Joint Light Tactical Vehicles, a new series of military vehicles designed for survivability and tactical mobility.

The first JLTVs were distributed to U.S. Army units in 2016. The IOTC received its first vehicle in January 2023, and two additional vehicles in June 2023.

The IOTC provides hands-on maintenance training for Active Duty, Reserve and National Guard Soldiers across the country. They offer a variety of sustainment and skill qualification courses, including the seven-week 91B Wheeled Vehicle Mechanic transition course which now includes a dedicated week of instruction on the JLTV.

Sgt. 1st Class Bradley Meyer is an instructor at the IOTC and received operator and maintenance level training on the JLTV at Oshkosh, the

vehicle manufacturer in Wisconsin. He then returned to Iowa to train other instructors in preparation for future courses.

"The capability of this truck is far beyond anything that we've had," said Meyer. "It's fun, it's exciting to see."

The introduction of the technologically advanced JLTV into the Army and other U.S. armed forces, including the Marine Corps, is just one indicator of the large-scale modernization efforts taking place throughout the Department of Defense. The vehicle will be operated in addition to the "Humvee," or High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicle, which the Army has used in training and combat since the 1970s. The Humvee proved to be vulnerable to IED attacks during the Iraq and Afghanistan Wars.

The U.S. Army's Combat Support and Combat Services Support office

said the Humvee is suited for its original purpose as a light utility truck and provides useful payload and mobility, but "was never intended to be a combat vehicle."

"Adding the protection Soldiers needed [armor] in today's full-spectrum threat environments to a Humvee substantially degraded its mobility, and in some cases eliminated its payload capacity," said Scott Davis, a representative of the CS & CSS.

That's where the JLTV comes in. Weighing in at around 13,800 pounds (give or take depending on its configuration), the vehicle sports a futuristic exterior with advanced computer technology integrated throughout its structure that makes it uniquely capable to handle heavy loads and protect service members from outside attacks. The computer systems also allow most troubleshooting to be done inside the vehicle using touch screen displays, streamlining daily maintenance for operators.

"The time of a paper book doesn't exist anymore," said Meyer. "We're to the point where operator level preventative maintenance and troubleshooting is all electronic and integrates into the truck. We can talk to the truck and the truck can talk to us. It's far more advanced than any other wheeled vehicle in our fleet."

Meyer represented the IOTC at the Iowa National Guard's Camp Dodge Summer Concert Series on June 29, where the public had the opportunity to get a close-up look at the new vehicle.

The JLTV's powerful suspension system, viewpoint cameras, automatic fire extinguisher and heated windshield were just some of the features highlighted as people took turns climbing into the driver's seat.

Meyer pointed out that as with all new equipment fielded in the military, there will be challenges and learning curves. Teaching Soldiers how to operate a complex, computer-based vehicle like the JLTV will take time. So far, the IOTC has hosted two 91B courses with instruction on the JLTV since acquiring the vehicles this year, and he hopes his students take away one key lesson:


"Seven weeks isn't long enough to make Soldiers into expert mechanics," said Meyer. "So, one of the things I really strive to hammer home is you have to be a lifelong learner. My challenge to them is to take the skills that we talked about in class and continue to research, study and practice them."

















#### IOWA NATIONAL GUARD MEDICS CARE FOR HOMELESS VETERANS

CEDAR RAPIDS, lowa - "Give me strength to lead by caring." It's a line of the time-honored Army Combat medic prayer that encapsulates what's often most endearing about the combat medic. They train hard to be experts in their craft, but their actions are often led by compassion.

On Sept. 7, 2023, medics from the 134<sup>th</sup>
Ambulance Company from Johnston loaded up in field medical ambulances and drove to an event in Cedar Rapids — to show they care.

Iowa National Guard medics supported the 17<sup>th</sup> annual "Five Seasons Stand Down" at the Veterans Memorial Stadium. The event is a resource fair for veterans and others experiencing homelessness.

Community members came from all corners of the city and all over the hardship spectrum.

Some were living in tents in wooded encampments or natural urban shelters such as bridges and parking garages. Others lived in community-supported shelters or were housed

but at risk of homelessness.

Lining the inside stadium corridor were scores of tables with over 70 local governmental and nongovernmental organizations waiting to serve them, providing everything from haircuts to employment counseling, medical evaluations, and free clothing and food.

The 134th medics are combat-trained and specialize in sophisticated lifesaving battlefield interventions. At the stand down, they checked vital signs. As veterans took seats, the medics fastened blood pressure cuffs and pulse oximeters to them while listening to their heart rates with stethoscopes. And they exchanged stories about their service experiences.

"We were just happy to be there, to interact with all other service providers and veterans," said Sgt. Keaton Schultz, team leader from the 134<sup>th</sup> Medical Company. "Many of us joined [the Iowa National Guard] because we wanted to serve our communities. Today, we feel like we're doing it."

According to the Iowa Department of Veteran Affairs, there are over 30,400 homeless veterans nationwide. Although that is down from previous years, veterans are still overrepresented and at greater risk of homelessness than the general population. That risk has been attributed to several factors, including the heavy weight of duty and service veterans have carried.

A "stand down" is a military term for when Soldiers are ordered to rest. The "stand down" events are intended to provide momentary relief from the harsh realities of homelessness and show veterans the community cares.

"Participating in the stand down was meaningful to us because, as service members, we're familiar with the huge sacrifices these Soldiers, Sailors and Airmen have made during their time in the military and beyond," said Capt. Megan Cartwright, commander, 134th Ambulance Company. "The least we can do is be of service to them now."









#### KOSOVO STATE PARTNERSHIP

The Iowa National Guard enters its twelfth year of our state partnership with country of Kosovo. As conflict remains in Eastern Europe, Iowa's partnership remains a vital piece of deterrence and maintaining international security.

In April, units from the Iowa National Guard participated in a large-scale medical training exercise in Kosovo. This exercise aimed to enhance the medical capabilities of both the Iowa National Guard and the Kosovo Security Force, fostering cooperation and mutual learning.

A notable achievement during this period was Lt .Ylli Dalladaku, of the KSF, becoming the first Kosovar to complete the U.S. Army's Basic Officer Infantry Leaders Course. This accomplishment not only highlighted the dedication and skill of Dalladaku, but also

served as a testament to the growing professional ties between the Iowa National Guard and the KSF.

Governor Reynolds completed her first trip to Kosovo in June where she met with President Viosa Osmani and other Kosovo leadership to discuss the lowa-Kosovo sister state agreement, the State Partnership Program, and opportunities for commercial partnerships. The Iowa National Guard was directly involved and affirmed our steadfast commitment with the KSF.

In a momentous occasion, the Iowa National Guard then welcomed Kosovo President Osmani to the state in October. This marked her first visit to Iowa since assuming the presidency. The visit not only deepened the diplomatic relations between Kosovo and lowa but also reflected the significance of the

state partnership program in fostering international connections.

President Osmani thanked the Iowa National Guard and noted "Our partnership grows stronger by the day as we expand our cooperation in all areas of common and strategic interest, such as defense, agriculture, tourism, and energy."

In 2023, the lowa National Guard demonstrated a significant increase in its efforts to engage with the public and foster stronger community ties. One notable aspect of their involvement was the provision of Army funeral honors, where they supported a staggering 1,471 funerals throughout the year. This commitment to honoring fallen heroes not only paid tribute to those who served in the Army but also showcased the National Guard's dedication to serving the community in times of loss.

Furthermore, the Iowa National Guard actively participated in 78 large-scale community events, contributing to the vibrancy and cohesion of local communities. These events served as platforms for the Iowa National Guard to showcase their capabilities, foster relationships, and engage with residents on a personal level. By actively participating in these events, the National Guard ensured their presence was felt and valued by the community.

In collaboration with the Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve, the Iowa National Guard

conducted 16 civic leader engagements. These engagements provided an opportunity for leaders from various sectors to interact with Guard members, gaining insights into their roles and responsibilities. This not only fostered understanding and appreciation but also strengthened the bond between the National Guard and the community's leadership.

## 2<sup>ND</sup> BRIGADE COMBAT TEAM 34<sup>TH</sup> INFANTRY DIVISION

#### 2023 Accomplishments

1<sup>st</sup> Squadron, 113<sup>th</sup> Cavalry Regiment: The Cavalry culminated their training year with a 15-day annual training at Fort Riley, Kansas. Their Soldiers completed individual and crewserved weapons qualifications, mortar live-fire exercises, mounted crew gunnery, squad livefire maneuver exercises, platoon situational training exercises, zodiac boat operations, field feeding operations, reconnaissance operations, and a spur ride. Additionally the squadron conducted a Situational Training Exercise that integrated additional Soldiers from 1st Battalion, 194th Field Artillery for indirect fire support, establishing observation points, and trained and prepared for large scale combat operations.

Most recently the squadron sent a headquarters element and one maneuver platoon to the Southwest border along with other Iowa National Guard Soldiers. The Cavalry Headquarters team was responsible for the command and control of the task force and oversaw operations. The 1-113th engaged with their community and once again held their Fall Family Festival in Sioux City

attended by hundreds of residents.

1st Battalion, 194th Field Artillery: The 1-194
FA conducted multiple gunnery training
sessions with their artillery cannons across
the U.S. The battalion training included day
and night fires using multiple types of artillery
ammunition. Additionally, the battalion utilized
radar equipment to track airborne rounds,
virtual reality simulators to improve forward
observer skills, and incorporated helicopter air
lift training.

In total, the 1-194th FA fired over 2,000 artillery rounds in 2023. One particularly memorable event for Soldiers was seeing the Northern Lights while conducting night firing while at Camp Ripley, Minnesota. 84 Soldiers from across the battalion spent 4 weeks at Fort Johnson, Louisiana (formerly known as Ft. Polk) where they trained as an opposition force against a Hawaii National Guard infantry brigade. Training as the enemy force is another way to improve understanding and ability to fight in large-scale combat operations.

1st Battalion, 133rd Infantry Regiment: Soldiers of the "Ironman Battalion" executed a mission at the Joint Readiness Training
Center in Ft. Johnson, Louisiana as opposing
forces. The rifle company's capstone
validation was a Squad Live-fire Exercise
focused on deliberate attack and the reduction
of an obstacle conducted at Camp Dodge
Joint Maneuver Training Center. Their staff
identified a need to utilize all the resources at
its disposal to develop a more mobile,
survivable, and agile command post in
support of large-scale combat operations.

Leaders and Soldiers across the Ironman Battalion utilized these training opportunities to build resiliency and esprit de corps, helping to foster the next generation of citizen Soldiers. Lastly, leaders from across the battalion acted as Observer Controller Trainers for our state partner, Kosovo during the Defender Europe Exercise 2023.

### 2<sup>ND</sup> BRIGADE COMBAT TEAM 34<sup>TH</sup> INFANTRY DIVISION

1st Battalion, 168th Infantry Regiment: Known as the "Lethal Battalion," culminated their training year with a 15-day annual training at Camp Guernsey Training Center, Wyoming. The training focused on individual and crewserved weapons qualifications, mortar live fire exercises, mounted crew gunnery, air assault operations, squad live fire maneuver exercises, and platoon Situational Training Exercises. Units conducted situation training exercises in the rifle companies, heavy weapons company, headquarters company, scout platoon, medical platoon, and distribution platoon.

These STXs integrated enabling forces for indirect fires, assault aviation, field feeding operations, and their command communications network. In August, they conducted their battalion dining-out in Council Bluffs, Iowa, with over 500 in attendance. A dining-out is a formal affair where Soldiers invite their spouses or other guests to a dinner and dancing to celebrate the unit's accomplishments. Lt. Gen. Jon Jensen, the Director of the Army National Guard and former 1-168th Soldier, was the Guest of Honor.

224th Brigade Engineer Battalion: The 224th BEB provided the engineer, communication, and intelligence operations support to the 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 34th Infantry Division, throughout the year. The 224th BEB Soldiers are stationed throughout Southeast Iowa and boast 57 different occupational jobs to make up the organization's functionality. These positions vary from tactical to technical skills which help support efforts on the modern battlefield.

Soldiers of the 224<sup>th</sup> BEB competed in many state-level competitions taking the top award in the Governors Ten Marksmanship match, Expert Culinary Competition, and the NCO of the Year.

334th Brigade Support Battalion: The 334th BSB plans, synchronizes, and executes sustainment operations in support of the entire 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 34th Infantry Division; and provides supplies, maintenance, and medical services to the point of need.

Their companies completed annual training during various months in 2023. Units utilized the Sustainment Training Center, at Camp

Dodge in Johnston for their two-week training which allowed each Soldier to focus on improving their particular military job skills. Company A had multiple Soldiers win awards at the annual Truck Rodeo (driving, securing loads, and hauling equipment) competition. Additionally, Iowa's Soldier of the Year, Spc. John Shields, was selected from the 334th BSB.

#### 2024 Objectives

The brigade objective for 2024 is to successfully complete an Exportable Combat Training Center rotation at Camp Ripley, Minnesota, where the units will build tactical and technical proficiency at the platoon levels. During this exercise, Soldiers will build camaraderie and practice the skills necessary to win in large scale combat operations environments.

## 734TH REGIONAL SUPPORT GROUP

#### 2023 Accomplishments

The 734<sup>th</sup> Regional Support Group is composed of 12 individual units located within 15 communities across the state of Iowa. This includes two logistics battalion headquarters located in Johnston. The units within the RSG provide a vast array of capabilities and perform a multitude of military jobs. Throughout the year, RSG units continued to engage with communities and extend the impact of the Iowa National Guard through STEM events, fitness camps, open houses, and local festivities.

The 1133<sup>rd</sup> Transportation Company deployed to Poland and conducted transportation missions across Europe. The Soldiers drove over 1.2 million miles in support of US and Allied forces as part of European deterrence operations. In May and June, the 833rd Engineer Company sent a group of Soldiers to Kosovo where they participated in the Defender Europe training exercise, to enhance the Iowa National Guard's state partnership with the Kosovo Security Force.

The 831<sup>st</sup> Engineer Company completed multiple infrastructure and terrain improvement projects at Camp Dodge as part of their premobilization training before deploying to the Middle East in September.

In June, the 1168<sup>th</sup> Transportation Company and 1034<sup>th</sup> Combat Sustainment Support Battalion headquarters completed an Exportable Combat Training Capability Exercise at Fort Stewart, Georgia, supporting the 30th Armored Brigade Combat Team. This training simulated an environment for large-scale combat operations and pushed units to build their overall proficiency. The 2168<sup>th</sup> Transportation Company supported multiple units throughout the year transporting military equipment across the Midwest.

The 1034<sup>th</sup> Composite Supply Company began a two-year assignment as part of a federal disaster response team. They conducted training with

partners from multiple states and agencies across both the state and federal government. Upon conclusion of the training in May, they were validated as part of a Department of Defense, national level rapid response element. The 3655<sup>th</sup> Classification and Inspection Company and 186<sup>th</sup> Military Police Company trained and were validated as the National Guard Reactionary Force for the State of Iowa. This task force is Iowa's contingent for any National Guard quick response efforts within the U.S.

3654<sup>th</sup> Support Maintenance Company culminated their training year completing a rotation at the Sustainment Training Center on Camp Dodge. The Soldiers honed their skills in HVAC, Welding, Electronics repair, and general mechanical work.

As part of the Army's modernization process, the 1034th CSC and 3654th SMC were designated as A Company and B Company of the 1347th Division Sustainment Support Battalion. The two units maintained their current mission, and work locations but are now aligned to the 34th Infantry Division.

#### 2024 Objectives

In 2024, 734<sup>th</sup> RSG units will continue to train on their various missions both at home and abroad. Multiple units from the 734<sup>th</sup> RSG will provide direct support to the 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 34<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division, as they conduct XCTC at Camp Ripley, Minnesota. Additionally, they look forward to welcoming home Soldiers that have been deployed and reintegrating them into their formations and communities.

### 671ST TROOP COMMAND

### 2023 Accomplishments

The 671st Troop Command oversaw numerous events through 2023. Chaplain (Lt. Col.)

Martha Kester was selected as the first female state chaplain for the Iowa National Guard and shared the distinction of being the first female State Chaplain within the National Guard. She was promoted to the rank of Colonel on July 29, 2023, which is the U.S. Army Chaplain Corps' birthday and happened to mark the 12-year anniversary of her return from a deployment to Afghanistan.

With the retirement of Maj. Gen. Corell in February, Governor Reynolds selected Brig. Gen. Stephen Osborn as the 28th Adjutant General of the Iowa National Guard. The "Adjutant General" is the highest-ranking position within the Iowa National Guard. Maj. Gen. Osborn assumed his duties as TAG on February 5, 2023. After becoming TAG, Maj. Gen. Osborn identified Command Sgt. Maj. Matthew Strasser to be the new Command Senior Enlisted Leader for the Iowa National Guard. The CSEL serves as TAG's senior military advisor on enlisted matters, and ensures the needs of Soldiers and Airmen are

met. Command Sgt. Maj. Strasser assumed his responsibilities on July 9, 2023.

Col. William (Bill) Kelly, who serves as a Staff Judge Advocate in the Iowa National Guard, was appointed as a United States Magistrate Judge of the Southern District of Iowa on July 7, 2023. Magistrate Judges are appointed by the Judges of the United States District Court for a term of eight years and are eligible for reappointment to successive terms.

The Iowa National Guard Trench Run was held on August 13, 2023, hosted by the headquarters and headquarters detachment of the 671<sup>st</sup> TC. This annual event provided an opportunity for the public to experience some aspects of military training and see the training areas on Camp Dodge that are typically reserved for military use only. Participation increased from last year with 294 total registrants and over 300 participants.

### 2024 Objectives

In 2024, the 671<sup>st</sup> TC will continue to provide support and assistance to the lowa Army National Guard to ensure all assigned state

and federal missions are accomplished.

Additional emphasis will be placed on the Iowa National Guard Trench Run to increase early and overall registration for the event. # 67TH TROOP COMMAND

### **2023 Accomplishments**

As the major subordinate command for both the 248<sup>th</sup> Aviation Support Battalion and the 109<sup>th</sup> Multifunctional Medical Battalion, the 67<sup>th</sup> Troop Command was able to execute multiple state and federal missions over the past year. With a focus on unit readiness, the organization was able to accomplish its missions, both domestic and abroad, while strengthening community and civil partnerships.

In 2023, the 67th TC welcomed home the 209th Medical Company Area Support from their deployment to Poland. Their mission supported Operation Atlantic Resolve and NATO's Enhanced Forward Presence mission which enables the U.S. to provide deterrence to adversaries while also supporting our NATO partners. The 209th Soldiers provided medical services for over 5,000 military and civilian patients which included physical therapy, physical exams, x-rays, labs and other routine treatments. The medical support provided by the 209th MCAS spanned across five countries, including Poland, Germany, Lithuania, and Estonia. Additionally, several Soldiers competed in a multinational Norwegian foot march, strengthening our bilateral relationships.

Throughout 2023, the 248th Aviation Support Battalion supported several community engagement events such as boss lifts and flyovers for nationally-televised football games. They also focused on training events in Iowa, participated in Northern Strike Training Exercise in Michigan and conducted annual training events at Fort McCoy, Wisconsin, and Camp Ripley, Minnesota.

The 109th Medical Battalion focused on real world training scenarios for enhanced domestic medical response. Units of the 109th units also took part in exercises such as Northern Strike to include a successful redeployment of the 209th MCAS from its mission in Poland.

The 67<sup>th</sup> TC headquarters participated in statewide domestic operations training through Vigilant Guard. The unit was able to exercise their domestic response capabilities while building disaster responsiveness, partnerships, and preparedness with its state and federal partners.

C Company , 2-211<sup>th</sup> General Support Aviation Battalion, Minnesota Army National Guard, and the 294<sup>th</sup> MCAS participated in Michigan's largest exercise, Northern Strike. Northern Strike is an Army National Guard sponsored, multi-component, multinational exercise designed to build readiness and enhance interoperability with allied forces. The units provided real world medical evacuation and validated medical company readiness through an enhanced training environment.

The 34<sup>th</sup> Army Band continued their high-tempo activities through the entirety of 2023. Soldiers performed at over 80 musical events, 70 funerals, and high-profile events such as the Governor's inauguration and the Hy-Vee Homefront 250 Indy Car race.

2nd Battalion, 641<sup>st</sup> Aviation Detachment Operational Support Airlift continued to stay busy this last year with a total of 284 flight missions spanning across the continental United States, Alaska, and Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. Their missions not only supported active duty components, but also assisted in multiple lowa National Guard mobilization support cells for deploying lowa units.

### 2024 Objectives

In 2024, the 67<sup>th</sup> TC will align training and resources to meet the needs of both the state and federal missions. The mobilization of Company C, 2nd Battalion, 211<sup>th</sup> Medical deployment to Kosovo to support a NATO mission is one of their top priorities. The NATO led international peacekeeping mission is an enduring one that focuses on country and regional stability. The 294<sup>th</sup> MCAS will maintain enhanced readiness as a designated contingency response force unit, staying ready to respond to any emergent mission. Lastly, multiple aviation and medical units from the 67<sup>th</sup> TC will be supporting the 2nd Brigade, 34<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division at the Exportable Combat Training Capability exercise.

# 185TH AIR REFUELING WING

### 2023 Accomplishments

In February, the 185<sup>th</sup> ARW received its 1<sup>st</sup> Air Force Meritorious Unit Award, an honor one level higher than its 15 previous Air Force Outstanding Unit Awards.

In August, 185<sup>th</sup> ARW was the key participant in the first ever "Innovative Readiness Training" project in Iowa, hosted by Woodbine School District. IRT projects were created with the goal of combining military training with civic involvement. The 185<sup>th</sup> Civil Engineering Squadron installed a 30,000 square foot Tension Fabric Structure to support the construction of the adjacent IGNITE Pathways Regional Center.

In September, 133d Test Squadron, a geographically separated unit under the 185<sup>th</sup>, celebrated its 75th Anniversary as a test squadron providing support to Air Combat Command directed Operational and Developmental Test Systems and Command & Control for the 114<sup>th</sup> Fighter Wing, and 185th Air Refueling Missions. This one-of-a-kind mission is the only one in the Air National Guard and we're proud of their legacy.

In October, the 185<sup>th</sup> Operations Squadron held a ribbon cutting for its building renovation, a \$13M project adding new capabilities like Global Aircrew Strategic Network Terminal, an alert facility, Sensitive Compartmented Information Facility, and staging for several new assets in the future. The original brick building was utilized, but the interior was completely demolished and rebuilt with a new briefing room, secure vault, offices, aerial refueling simulator, and flight equipment area. This project's completion is the starting point of a multi-year project of renovations to buildings at the Wing, solidifying its future in Sioux City.

### 2024 Objectives

The 185th continues working with the National Guard Bureau, the City of Sioux City, and the FAA on Ramp and Runway reconstruction. This will include hardening the existing 1,000 LF paved overruns, constructing runway extensions, constructing a cargo holding pad, and repairing the aircraft parking ramp. The project request stems from the conversion the 185th did in 2003 from F-16s to the KC-135 Stratotanker. During this conversion, the ramp and runway were placed under waivers to accept the weight and capacity of the refuelers. This project has garnered the attention of the city, lowa, Nebraska, and South Dakota Governors, and Congress in support of the project and the capabilities it would add to the future mission sets the Wing may receive.

Through this process, the 185<sup>th</sup> also continues conversations on a new Hangar replacement with the National Guard Bureau, replacing its aging building originally built in 1956 to house the F-100. This project has gone through the initial planning process and is going through the National Guard Bureau for approvals and continues to meet deadlines for future development of the Wing. The 185th Paint Facility has also been identified as a potential painting location for F-35 Lightning II. This capability would add a unique ability to the 185th, a unique skill set that many paint facilities do not possess. The 185th continues to work with the corresponding agencies to identify and support their selection process.

In February, the 132d Wing received its 1st Air Force Meritorious Unit Award, an honor one level higher than its 16 previous Air Force Outstanding Unit Awards.

In August, the 132d Wing was the key participant in "Innovative Readiness Training" (IRT) Missouri and Arkansas, where 132d Medical Group "MEDHAWKS" provided medical care to at risk communities while 132d Force Support Squadron members provided mobile kitchen capabilities, feeding hundreds of military members and civilians IRT projects were created with the goal of combining military training with civic involvement..

The 132d Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance Group remained engaged at historic levels with 98 Airmen on active-duty orders supporting worldwide operations spanning from 13 locations in over 8 different countries. Additionally, the 132d ISR Group has supported five major exercises as well as operations in support of the Secretary of Defense's number one priority.

# 185TH REGIONAL TRAINING INSTITUTE

**TOTAL JOINT FORCE** 

Every year, hundreds of Soldiers from active duty, reserves, and the National Guard attend training at 185<sup>th</sup> Regional Training Institute and Iowa Ordinance Training Center both located at Camp Dodge. The purpose of the 185<sup>th</sup> RTI is to provide institutional training dedicated to developing versatile innovative Soldiers and leaders for a mission ready agile force serving our nation, state, and community. The 185<sup>th</sup> RTI provides courses to qualify Soldiers to be combat medics, automated logistical specialists, small arms and artillery repairer, and wheeled vehicle mechanics through military occupational specialty transition courses. They also develop leaders through the Ordnance Senior Leader Course and re-certify combat medics through comprehensive medical training.

In addition, they provide medical training, combat lifesaver courses and recertification, and medic sustainment through the Medical Simulation Training Center. They internally build readiness for the Iowa Army National Guard by hosting Officer Candidate School and Warrant Officer Candidate School through leadership training and development.

### 2023 Accomplishments

The 185<sup>th</sup> RTI completed U.S.Training and Doctrine Command accreditation in 2023 ensuring that all actions within the RTI are conducted in accordance with regulation and policies established by TRADOC and the Army in support of the One Army School System. The 185<sup>th</sup> RTI received a 97.6% and the Iowa Ordnance Training Center 98.1% accreditation ratings validating both institutions as Centers of Excellence. In 2023, the 185<sup>th</sup> RTI provided instruction, training, and

development to over 1,500 Soldiers. The OCS program graduated 22 officer candidates with all 22 commissioning by the end of the year. The WOCS program graduated and assessed 10 warrant officer candidates.

### 2024 Objectives

In 2024, the 185<sup>th</sup> RTI primary objective is to build readiness for the lowa Army National Guard, increasing the number of officers, focusing on growing the officer and warrant officer candidate school, and finding the right leaders from across our state units. The OCS and WOCS programs will continue to grow in order to meet the demands of the state and the Army National Guard. In addition, the 185th RTI hosts the company commander and first sergeant pre-command course providing the tools and information needed to successfully navigate the challenges of leading an organization.

They will continue to refine and improve the RTI, their processes and courses. The 185<sup>th</sup> RTI will also continue to provide exemplary training instructed by experienced professional cadres to army Soldiers and leaders supporting the One Army School System.

### LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY

LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION

The Iowa National Guard would like to thank the 90th General Assembly for appropriating nearly \$12.5M in support of Governor Reynold's recommended budget for the Department of Public Defense. The General Fund budget for the department is now at \$6,963,037 with a full-time employee authorization of 248; this is an overall General Fund increase of nearly \$1,500,000.

Thank you to the members of the Justice Systems Appropriations Subcommittee for their efforts and hard work in appropriating the General Funds necessary to effectively execute all the requirements within the Department of Public Defense. Also, thank you to the legislators on the Transportation, Infrastructure, and Capitals Appropriation Subcommittee who worked tirelessly to fund

the maintenance and infrastructure requirements within Camp Dodge and around the state. Without these state matching funds totaling \$5.75M, we would have been unable to leverage the federal funding of more than \$22M to meet a portion of our maintenance and construction needs.

As the lowa National Guard moves forward toward the next legislative session, there continues to be a growing demand for the lowa National Guard Service Scholarship (INGSS), and we look forward to working with the legislature as we propose changes to expand the availability of INGSS to our Service Members. This program has been an outstanding recruiting and retention tool since its inception over a decade ago.

As demonstrated in the table on page 52, during the academic year 2022-2023, with the help of Iowa College Aid Commission, the 90th General Assembly and the Governor's staff, the Iowa National Guard was appropriated \$6.6M in INGSS funds at the 100% rate. Currently, academic year 2023-2024 we project to spend in excess of \$6.5M while maintaining the award at 100%.
